Roanoke EC celebrates new Copper Theft Law

Roanoke EC and electric cooperatives across North Carolina enthusiastically welcomed a new copper theft law that took effect on October 1. A key provision of the law is that it will prohibit metal recyclers from paying cash for copper brought to them by any seller. Roanoke EC believes this is critical to reducing copper theft because thieves often quickly sell stolen copper for cash that is then used to purchase methamphetamines and other illegal drugs.

Copper theft is a serious problem that plagues our industry; it is dangerous, costly and illegal, and the new legislation is an important first step in eliminating this problem.

A recent survey conducted by the North Carolina Association of Electric Cooperatives showed that electric cooperatives in our state suffered more than \$1 million in damage as a result of copper theft in 2011. While this problem is expensive for co-op members, the most serious threat is that it's extremely dangerous. Recently, one person was killed trying to steal copper from a cooperative substation. We are thankful that



Roanoke has not experienced any fatalities to date.

"North Carolina's electric cooperatives supported the legislation and through a grassroots effort worked to help pass it into law," said Marshall Cherry, vice president of marketing, member and technical services. Co-ops were part of a wide-ranging coalition that also included law enforcement agencies and homebuilders.

Among other provisions, the new law requires recyclers to take photographs of sellers with the metals they are selling and record information about the make,

model, year, color and license plate number of the vehicle used to deliver the metals.

"We look forward to working with law enforcement to apprehend and prosecute copper thieves," Cherry said. "The crime is dangerous and expensive, and this law will help us run a safe and efficient electric system."

While we're encouraged this law will help eliminate copper theft, we ask that you remain on the lookout for suspicious activity around our facilities, including substations, poles and transformers. Call 911 if you see any suspicious activity.

Home Safety: Check rooms for hazards

It's a fact — according to the National Safety Council, more accidents occur off the job than on the job for people of working age, and children and the elderly are the most likely groups to experience accidents at home. Most home accidents are preventable and result from a lack of home maintenance. Use the following checklist to spot possible safety hazards in your home.

Kitchen

Make sure all of your appliances carry an Underwriters Laboratories, Inc. (UL) seal, which means the item was tested and found safe to use. Check electrical cords for fraying or cracking, step stools for splitting or cracking and throw rugs for tripping hazards like bumps and turned-up corners.

Living room

Just as you did in the kitchen, check rugs and runners, electrical cords, lamps and other lighting. Have a professional inspect the fireplace and chimney for fire hazards, and make sure all passageways are clear.

Bathroom

Make sure small appliances, like hairdryers and curling irons, are marked with a UL seal and are plugged into a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI)

outlet. These outlets monitor electricity flowing in a circuit and trip the circuit if an imbalance is detected, protecting people from electric shock. Check the bathtub, shower, rugs and mats for slipping hazards and make sure cabinets that contain medicines or cleaning supplies are inaccessible to children.

Bedrooms

Examine rugs, runners, electrical and telephone cords, and make sure the area around the bed is clear of items that could cause you to trip.

Basement/garage/workshop

Make sure all power tools bear the UL mark. Check fuse and breaker boxes for possible malfunction. Inspect extension cords and cords on tools and lawn and garden supplies for fraying. Check for proper ventilation and make sure flammable liquids are stored in appropriate containers and at an acceptable temperature.

Stairs

Make sure there's proper lighting on and around stairways. Examine handrails and steps for possible defects or weaknesses, and test stair coverings for possible tripping hazards.

Practice safety and report hazards you see

One of Roanoke Electric Cooperative's missions is to provide safe electricity. To help keep our communities safe, we are educating our members on potential electrical hazards that they should report to our office and ways to protect themselves and their loved ones.

Hazards to Report:

- ✓ Low power lines
- ✓ Leaning or broken poles
- ✓ Cable or phone lines tangled in power lines
- ✓ Open meter bases
- ✓ Someone tampering with a meter

Things to Remember

- ✓ Contact the office before you dig so that underground wires can be marked
- ✓ Do not attempt to cut tree limbs that are tangled in power lines
- ✓ Do not plant trees near poles
- ✓ Do not attach signs or deer stands to poles
